### SA Movers and Shakers

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### 1) DTEI bicycle funding allocations 2008-09

### 2) \$3 million bicycle budget for Adelaide City

The ACC has approved a budget of \$3 million for a 3 year plan to improve cycling. The Draft Bicycle Action Plan 2008-

2011, which features a range of initiatives aimed at providing greater opportunity for people to safely ride their bikes to and from the City and throughout the Park Lands, is a step up for the Council. Major features of the Draft Action Plan are the completion of the City's primary "on road" bike lane network, the construction in Sturt Street of South Australia's first Copenhagen-style bicycle lane - which positions the bike lane between the kerb and the on-street parking, an increase in bicycle parking and additional locations for the Free City Bikes scheme. ### **3) Danish Bicycle Exhibition – Dreams on Wheels – Adelaide, 9 to 18 September**

The Dreams on Wheels exhibition, which has toured Canberra, Sydney and Melbourne, will be coming to Adelaide soon, with the support of ACC.

The exhibition showcasing Danish cycling culture and innovative Danish bicycle design will be on display at the Old Methodist Meeting Hall, 25 Pirie Street Adelaide (behind ACC customer centre), on Tuesday 9th to Friday 12th and Monday 15th to Thursday 18th from 10am to 4pm. The exhibition promotes cycling in a broader cultural context, displaying Danish urban cityscapes alongside urban visions for Australia by Danish architect Jan Gehl, and exhibiting bikes ranging from the family friendly to high tech. Admission is free.

### **4) *be active* Recreation and Sport Industry Awards – nominations close Fri 5 September**

Nominations are now open for the *be active* Rec and Sport Industry Awards, which recognise and reward achievements and innovation by individuals and organisations that promote good practice across the SA sport, outdoor recreation, community recreation and fitness sectors. The Awards also aim to stimulate the sport, active recreation and fitness industries to adopt innovative and effective practices that will improve its performance and the quality of its services. In addition to the prestige associated with being recognised in the Awards, winners receive cash prizes.

### **5) Record low NSW road toll**

Preliminary figures of 445 fatalities on NSW's roads in 2007 are the lowest loss of life since World War Two and a 10% reduction on last year's figure. This is the 5th consecutive year the road toll has reduced, despite a steady increase in traffic on roads. The figures, which will not be finalised until the NSW coroner confirms the cause of each road fatality later this year, also showed reductions of:

- 29% in speed related fatalities from the previous year;
- deaths from P plate driver crashes, from 95 in 2006 to 73 in 2007;
- passenger fatalities to 76 in 2007, the lowest since those records began in 1939;
- pedestrian deaths to 67 in 2007, the lowest since records began in 1928.

### **6) Cyclist arrangements for Anzac Highway works: July – December 2008 (approx.)**

As works progress on the northern half of the bridge deck near the South Road and ANZAC Highway intersection, the cycle lane for city bound traffic near the intersection has been temporarily removed. This means that cyclists heading towards the City on ANZAC Highway from Glenelg will have to merge with traffic for a short distance near the works at the South Road intersection. The cyclist lane begins again on the eastern side of the intersection just outside the Home Ideas Centre Ashford. See <http://www.adelaideconnect.com.au/>

### **7) Road grants announced**

The state government has announced distribution of three types of roads grants to local governments in SA: general purpose Financial Assistance Grants, a special projects component of the Roads to Recovery Grants and Supplementary Local Road Grants to Local Government in SA for 2008/09. Grants for the metro area include:

- \$110,000 to the Adelaide City Council for resurfacing Pulteney St from North Tce to Rundle St.
- \$740,000 to Unley Council for upgrading George St between Leicester St and Greenhill Rd.
- \$225,000 to Tea Tree Gully Council to improve pavements and reseal part of Greenwith Rd.
- \$300,000 to Charles Sturt Council to repair and improve pavements, kerbs and footpaths along Welland Ave.
- \$718,000 to West Torrens Council to reseal and pave Scotland Rd.

### **8) Tour Down Under still Pro**

Following negotiations in early August between the UCI and EPA (Editions Philippe Amaury, the owner of ASO and Société du Tour de France) under the auspices of the IOC, the UCI has presented a plan for the future of professional cycling. With this plan, the UCI has settled a long-running dispute with the Amaury Sport Organisation that threatened to dismantle the entire UCI ProTour teams in 2009 – and the well-being of the Tour Down Under's ProTour status.

### **9) Port River bridges open**

The Tom 'Diver' Derrick Bridge (road) and the Blessed Mary MacKillop Bridge (rail) have been opened. The new bridges, which are high-level opening bridges connecting to the Port River Expressway, will take heavy vehicles out of downtown Port Adelaide, improving safety and further enhancing the precinct – especially for pedestrians and cyclists. The design of the road bridge includes a shared path for pedestrians and cyclists, a large window (glass curtain wall) to facilitate viewing of the opening mechanisms and viewing platforms on the road bridge, with stairs and ramps providing access from the wharf

- For the **urban bike station** spotter: new to Auckland, New Zealand, is **BikeCentral**. Located in the Britomart (a public transport hub), BikeCentral offers safe, secure bicycle parking, plus access to private lockers, showers and changing areas, coffee, fresh food and free wireless internet, rental bicycles and an on-site repair service for minor repairs. All inclusive rates start at NZD 25 per week. Christchurch and Wellington are next. (Also check out Chicago's McDonald's Cycle Center and, on the West Coast, Bikestation.) - **Free public transport** passes could be included with the sale of **residential units**, and private parking also could be eliminated outside unit blocks and occupants encouraged to share vehicles in car clubs, as part of a strategy to tackle traffic in Queensland.
