2) The 30-Year Plan for Greater Adelaide

- Has been finalised and launched. See www.dplg.sa.gov.au for copies.
- The govt has established a new Government Planning and Coordination Committee (GPCC) to trouble shoot planning issues. The Committee will comprise Chief Executives from most state govt agencies, led by the Dept of Planning and Local Government and chaired by its Chief Exec Ian Nightingale. The GPCC will be accountable for delivering changes to support achieving the long-term goals set out in the 2008 Planning and Development Review and the 30-year Plan for Greater Adelaide.
- The govt will establish an Integrated Design Commission to better co-ordinate development in Adelaide. The IDC was proposed by Thinker in Residence, Prof Laura Lee, to have an enabling and co-ordinating role and advise on how to improve the quality of life through better design and by fostering innovation. The IDC will including the appointment of a Government Architect and is also supposed to ensure a good quality of streetscape as well as buildings. Laura Lee will be the first Commissioner.
- New legislation has been passed to protect linear parks and the valuable network of open space and cycling routes that they host. Amendments to the *River Torrens Linear Park Act* have imposed controls on the sale or disposal of government land adjacent to other waterways, as exist for the River Torrens. The new controls will cover land adjacent to the Gawler River, Little Para River, Dry Creek, Sturt River, Field River, Christie Creek, Onkaparinga River, Pedlar Creek and Port Willunga Creek. The legislation also allows other watercourses to be added if required.

5) Charter for Physical Activity and Public Health

The International Society for Physical Activity and Health and the Global Alliance for Physical Activity are developing a Charter for Physical Activity and Public Health, to be presented and ratified at the 3rd International Congress on Physical Activity and Public Health, in Toronto, Canada, May 5th - 8th 2010.

The Charter will articulate a consensus on ways to increase population levels of physical activity and provide a clear and common voice to the global community regarding physical activity - with a call for action to improve the health of populations.

Organizations involved in the promotion of physical activity will use the Charter as an advocacy tool to:

- influence decision makers at national and regional levels to elevate physical activity as a policy priority, and
- develop and implement cross-sector policies, plans and interventions that will increase population levels of physical activity.

10) Some infrastructure news...

- A new \$1 million, 27 metre pedestrian and cyclist bridge has been opened, connecting Northern Adelaide with the Adelaide Zoo and the Botanic Gardens across the River Torrens. The as-yet unnamed footbridge is an addition to the Park Lands Trail.
- The Adelaide Zoo new front entrance facilities have been officially declared open. Unfortunately, the contra-flow bicycle lane located on Plane Tree Drive (notable for being the only contra-flow bicycle lane in the City) was omitted from a redesigned parking area. However, Council expects to have constructed a shared use path providing two-way access through Botanic Park by the end of this financial year.
- The Zoo is also now sporting a new Free City Bikes node, as is the Convention Centre.
- The new Airport Bikeway has been opened.
- Glenelg Tramway Park, and specifically the 10-kilometre bike and walking path within it, has been renamed the Mike Turtur Bikeway. The SA cycling great and 2008 South Australian of the Year is also the Tour Down Under Race Director.
- The cycle overpass is now open on the west side of the South Road overpass, though links to the Mike Turtur Bikeway are yet to appear.
- The first stage of the Amy Gillett Bikeway in the Adelaide Hills has been opened. The 5 km of 2.5m wide bitumen shared path from Oakbank to Woodside is built on the old rail corridor, providing a safer journey for cyclists, pedestrians and horses than along Onkaparinga Valley Road. The path is expected to increase tourism in the area, providing benefits for local producers and small businesses. The Amy Gillett Bikeway is planned to eventually stretch 32 km to Mt Pleasant.
- Another section of ACC's Park Lands route is under construction, from Rundle Road to the corner of North Terrace and Hackney Road. This will link up with a path alongside Hackney Road, along the edge of Botanic Park.

11) Bike programs around the world - an update

- *Brisbane, CityCycle*: With 1,500 bikes due to be available from 113 stations later this year, the issue of helmets has not yet been solved. www.abc.net.au/news/stories/2010/04/13/2871105.htm
- *Monash Uni-Cycle*: students have designed and built a prototype bicycle which is set to become the iconic centrepiece of the university's bike sharing initiative. <http://fsd.monash.edu.au/news/bike-share-scheme>
- *Paris, Vélib*: Vélib remains a free-wheeling, popular success. However, vandalism and theft are so rampant that Paris city authorities have had to come to the aid of the company that runs the scheme. In less than 2.5 years, 8,000 bicycles have been stolen and 18,000 damaged beyond repair - equivalent to each of the 21,000 Vélibs, which cost €610 (£550) each, having been replaced at least once. www.independent.co.uk/news/world/europe/taxpayers-ride-to-rescue-of-parisbikeshare-scheme-1826456.html

 - *Mexico City, Ecobici*: Officials in Mexico's capital hope that by saturating certain neighborhoods with 3-speed bikes, they can persuade residents to consider making cycling at least part of their daily commute. - In Idaho, a *stop sign* now means 'slow down and yield' for cyclists.

- *Quote*: The claim put to me often by cycling lobby groups, "that bicycles are non-motorised vehicular transport and have as much right to be on the road as any other vehicle", was a claim I rejected firmly every time. And they never spoke up at all for the thousands of mums, dads and kids who wanted to ride their bikes on a weekend and couldn't because there were no safe facilities.

In rejecting the "we have a right to be on the road" mentality of cyclists and their lobby groups, I also took a measured and balanced policy position on how best to separate bicycles and vehicles from our roads over time.

But annual road taxes and purchase tax will be abolished, reducing the cost of a new car by 25%. The govt predicts that traffic will drop 15% and rush-hour congestion be halved when drivers begin getting regular bills, resulting in 7% fewer fatal accidents and a cut in carbon emissions from road travel of 10%.
